
CAMEROON



Dear Praying Partners;

So, we have big news! Maybe you have already heard, and maybe you haven't, but our time of service with LBTC is drawing to a close.

This past June, Concordia Lutheran Seminary in Edmonton approached me about whether I would be willing to be considered for a role on their faculty as professor of practical theology. Not wanting to close a door that I had not prayed about, I agreed to engage with their process. What seemed like only a possibility in June became a formal call last month. During the whole process and especially after receiving the call, our family was praying for God's guidance. Finally, as the calendar flipped from October to November we announced our decision to bring our season of work with LBTC to a close and to open a new chapter of service at the seminary.

IMPLICATIONS FOR THE WORK IN CAMEROON

We were part of many relationships and plans for ongoing work in Cameroon. Our departure from our field of service will undoubtedly leave a void that will need to be filled. That said, the work that LBTC is doing in Cameroon is first and foremost God's work and we trust and pray that He will provide for it. Throughout Scripture, we see God raising up and sending workers to continue His work after other workers have completed their time of service. St Paul expressed confidence in God's ownership of and provision of workers for His work when he wrote to the Corinthians, "I planted, Apollos watered, but God gave the growth." (1 Cor 3:6)

We invite you to join us in praying for God to provide workers, expatriate or Cameroonian, so that the work we were part of planting would be watered by others in ways that will result in great Kingdom growth to the glory of God!

Implications for our family

We are working with LBTC on plans that would see our active service conclude on December 31 st with provision for a one-month trip to Cameroon in 2025 so that we can bring closure to our time there and pack up and move some of our belongings.

As such, in the New Year, we will no longer be touring to share about our last term in Cameroon and the work that you, our mission partners, were a part of accomplishing through your prayers and financial support. We are grateful for the ~6 months of touring that we were able to do in 2024, but it saddens us to think that we will not be able to see many others that we had hoped to reconnect with in 2025. Whether we saw you already or not, please receive our heartfelt gratitude for your faithful partnership with us over the past 12 years.

Nizaa receiving Scripture - My payday was seeing the smile on this Nizaa man's face as he cast his eyes on God's Word in his language for the first time.




