Dear Partners in Prayer,

After 2 ½ months in Cameroon, we returned February 17th back to our home in New Hampshire, near our US children and grandchildren. It was a sudden transition from hot and dusty to cold and snowy. *The snow was so pretty!*

Thank God for health and renewed strength! A couple days after our return, first Martin then I (Joan) came down with a virus, (fever, coughing, fatigue) which took more than two weeks to get over. Thankfully, we are mostly better now.

Thank God for sustaining us and keeping us in health while in Cameroon! God protected us on

several trips over long, bumpy roads. We only had one tire blow-out, and God showed His kindness by sending a motorcycle driver at just the right time to help Martin change it!



We are thankful for all of you who have supported us in prayer, and with financial support through LBTC, making our travels possible!

We are thankful for the times we had with Rev. Tim and Erin Schulte. When we arrived, they were progressing with French lessons each morning. We tried to encourage them in the challenges of adapting to life in Cameroon. When we traveled with them to the Subula area, the Subula language committee, translators and literacy workers gathered to welcome them and expressed their deep appreciation for their coming for a preliminary visit.

However, learning to communicate in a new language, adapting to new people and a new culture, while navigating a relatively new marriage was very stressful. Sadly they have since returned to the United States, and are unlikely to return to Cameroon. **Please continue to pray for the Subula people** who are very motivated to have the Bible in their language. Thankfully, our church partners in Cameroon are taking further steps to help them.

From February 3-7, we participated in a training workshop, for the leaders of several language projects. LBT Cameroon regional Director, Rev. David Federwitz, LBT trainer Matt Kistler and Dr. Ndokobai (SIL Cameroon trainer) came to lead the training for the national workers in the various language projects.

They introduced a new software program called Rev79, (see Rev. 7:9) which helps each team member to keep their goals before them each month, and to report their progress regularly. This is a new reporting system. Many will report from their cell phones.

The training was in French. Martin and Tim Schulte translated for Matthew and David, (who do not speak French). It was a very challenging workshop, since participants are not all that used to adapting to new software on their computers or phones.

We traveled back to Yaoaunde, and enjoyed seeing LBTC missionary Kayla Falkenholdt again. She continues as a very enthusiastic teacher of



missionary kids in Yaounde since the Kuhn family left Cameroon last year. (Mike will be teaching at the seminary in Edmonton.)



Our son Sammy, Kelsey and their familv traveled to Yaounde before we left Cameroon. So we had the joy of seeing them again before we left, complete with more hugs from our four grandchildren in Cameroon.

Back in the US. Nathan planned a week in Florida for the three generation Weber guys.

Nathan, Ezekiel and Martin had a great time together!
